Tips to Celebrate Earth Day Every Day Stav Cool. Save Money

Plant trees for shade

A good landscape plan can do wonders. For instance, properly placed trees around the house can save between \$100 to \$250 annually. Get your shade tree now at www.treesfortucson.org or call us at 520-791-3109.

Draw your drapes

Keep your blinds, shades and curtain closed on south and west-facing windows during the day to block heat of direct sunlight.

Maintain air filters and HVAC equipment

Well-mainted equipment runs more efficiently, so replace or clean filters as needed and have your air conditioner unit serviced annually.

Install ceiling fans

A ceiling fan can make a room feel 6 or 7 degrees cooler while using less energy then a 100 watt light bulb. Run fans only when people are in the room.

Replace incandescent bulbs with compact flourescent bulbs (CFLs)

Lighting makes about 10% of home energy costs, and CFLs can save up to 75% of that energy. They also last longer, saving money on replacements

Re-Vamp Old Garden Hose

Make a soaker hose

Drill a few holes in that old hose. Attach it to a regular hose with a brass or plastic coupler that has two female receptors. Seal off the end of your soaker hose with a plastic end cap. Place the hose next to plants, or bury it in a shallow trench. Adjust the water flow to a trickle.

Hoses of course are great to use as siphons. Short lengths can be used to empty aquarium tanks. A handful of 10 foot lengths can be placed in a kid's pool to speed up draining time.

Carry heavy buckets mare comfortably. Cut a short length of hose and slit down one side. Slide over the handle of the bucket to make a solid gripping handle.

Corner Proctector

If you have a narrow driveway and find yourself constantly scraping the side of the garage, try nailing lengths of slit hose to the corners for a home-made "bumper".



School Minigrants



Tucson Clean & Beautiful, in cooperation with the Southern Arizona Environmental Management Society and the Arizona Native Plant Society-Tucson Chapter, recently awarded \$4,000 in minigrants, in addition to more than 130 trees, tools, and additional technical assistance to 11 Tucson area schools. Applicants were able to apply for a cash grant of up to \$500 for environmental improvements plus assistance with tools and up to 30 trees and related technical assistance for a school site planting project from Trees for Tucson, a program of Tucson Clean & Beautiful. 2015 grant winners included:



Spring Cleanup of Invasive Plants







Fountain Grass

Sahara Mustard

Due to our fantastic warm winter weather and timely rain. Spring arrived early in Southern Arizona. The conditions are just right for a wonderful wildflower season! Unfortunately, the conditions are also favorable for invasive plants like buffelgrass, fountain grass, and Sahara

Removing these nasty plants now before they go to seed means less work next growing season. Mowing is not recommended since the plants will survive and still produce seeds. The best practice is to dig them up, place them in a plastic trash bag, and throw them away. If the plants are green another option is to use herbicide, but be sure to read and comply with all the manufacturer's instructions.

Buffelgrass, fountain grass, and Sahara mustard are vigorous growers that easily outcompete our native plants, destroying beautiful Sonoran Desert habitat. Even worse, they are extreme fire hazards during our dry months, which are just around the corner. Eradicating these invasives is a great way to celebrate Earth Day!
